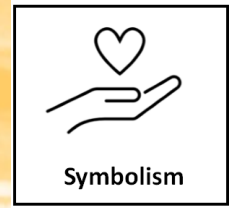

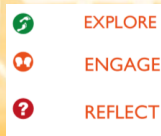
Religion—Hinduism

Key Vocabulary

Om	It contains all the sounds in the universe.
Om Namah Shiva	Bow down to Shiva
Kumkum	Red turmeric powder used for making the distinctive Hindu mark on the forehead
Murtis	A devotional image such as a statue, or "idol"
Aarti lamp	Lit divas that are placed before deities during prayer in temples and then used to bless worshippers
Puja tray	A tray. The items include a bell, a pot of water, a diva lamp, an incense burner, a pot of kum kum powder, and a spoon.
